# Types of Attraction



**Sexual**: the pull or craving towards a specific person for sexual contact. Finding someone "hot" or "sexually appealing."

**Romantic**: The intense need to have feelings of romantic love reciprocated by a specific person.

**Platonic**: A desire to connect and bond with another person, usually in the form of friendship.

**Aesthetic**: An appreciation of or connection to another person's appearance or presentation. It is usually visual but can also be auditory, olfactory, or relate to any of the other senses.

**Sensual**: A desire for touch that may include hugging, cuddling, kissing, petting, and/or other contact.



# Ace and Aro Identities 101



**Disclaimer:** This is just an introduction, and all of these definitions are fluid and can change. Please use this as a starting point to learn more and not as the final word in any discussion of orientations or identities.

### **Basics**

**Asexual (ace):** people who experience little to no sexual attraction or desire.

**Aromantic (aro):** people who experience little to no romantic attraction or desire.

**Allosexual (allo):** people who are not on the asexual spectrum.

**Alloromantic (alloro):** people who are not on the aromantic spectrum.

**Aspec:** an umbrella term for anyone who identifies as part of the asexual and/or aromantic spectra.

**Split Attraction Model (SAM):** the concept of distinguishing between ("splitting") romantic and sexual orientations or attractions, and/or other orientations. Aces can have any romantic orientation and aros can have any sexual orientation. When people do not experience their attractions in conjunction and/or in alignment with each other, the SAM can help them explain their experiences, desires, and patterns of attraction. However, not everyone will find it a useful tool and it can be overapplied.

Cake is a symbol for ace communities, and arrows are a symbol for aro communities





# Spectrum 101

**Gray:** describes people who experience attraction only rarely, weakly, under limited circumstances, or in another way that significantly differs from allo(ro)s. It is both a complete identity in itself and used as an umbrella term for people on the aro or ace spectra that are not at the far end of it.

**Demi:** describes people who do not experience attraction unless a strong emotional bond has been formed first. The emotional connection is necessary, but does not guarantee attraction.

**Quoi/WTF:** describes people who cannot clearly distinguish between different types of attractions or bonds. They may mistake one for the other or not differentiate them at all.

**Aego:** describes people who may have fantasies and enjoy the idea of specific activities, but they do not wish to be a participant themselves.

**Flux:** describes people who fluctuate along the spectrum, between asexual and allosexual or aromantic and alloromantic.

**Cupio:** describes people who do not experience a certain attraction but still desire to be in that kind of relationship.

# Institutional Harms





**Compulsory sexuality:** the societal assumption that everyone feels sexual attraction and desire, pressure to act on those feelings, and treating of sex as a life milestone

**Amatonormativity:** the societal focus on and prioritization of romantic relationships above all else, assumption that finding romantic love is a universal goal, and steering of people into marriage. The obsession with marriage in particular is called **matrimania**.

**Singlism:** the stereotyping, stigmatizing, marginalization of, and discrimination against people who are single.

**Heteronormativity:** the assumption, belief, and expectation that people are romantically and sexually attracted to people of the "opposite" gender and that this attraction is the "default" or "norm."

**Gatekeeping:** the act of restricting access to a space by doubting others' identities and lived experiences - in queer culture, it includes telling aspec people, among others, that they don't belong in the LGBTQ+ community.
